We'll also discuss different political philosophies and the history of political change in this country. COURSE FORMAT AND ORGANIZATION

For lectures, we'll be meeting online in [Newrow ClassConnect](#). Email/text me if you're ever having trouble getting into class. The lecture will be recorded and posted in the Recordings folder in Schoology.

Each lesson includes an interactive Nearpod. You are expected to participate and complete the Nearpod while in class, but you always have the opportunity to complete the interactive Nearpod at your own pace (links provided in Schoology). All grades close ONE week after the unit ends.

At the end of each unit, there will be an assessment (project, paper, test, etc.). There will also be other assignments, such as discussion posts, PlayPosit videos, and ClassKick documents.

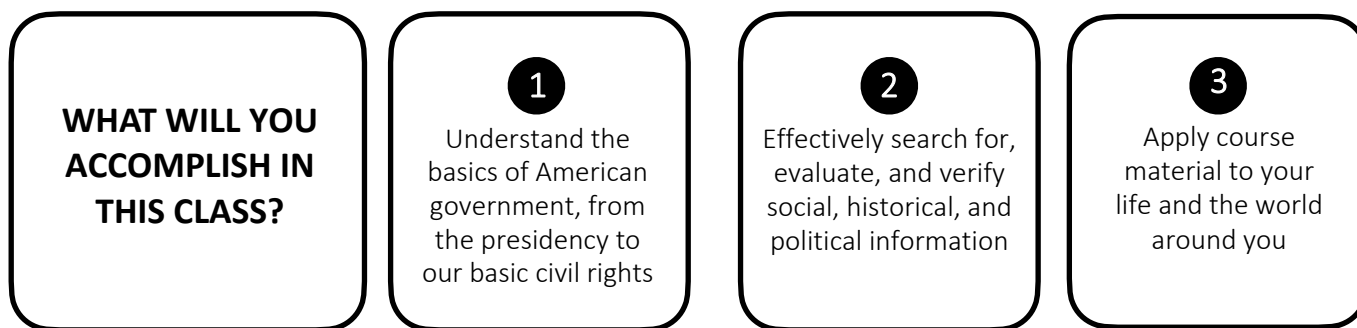

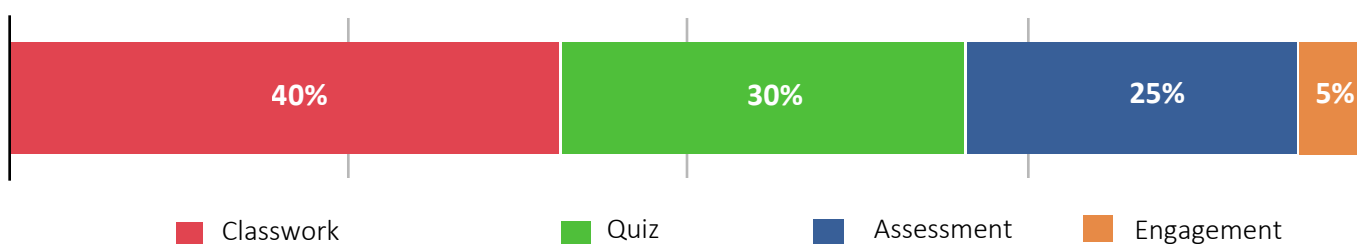

GRADING & ATTENDANCE

ATTENDANCE and PARTICIPATION is mandatory unless there is an excellent reason. You are expected to log into our Schoology course every school day (M–F) and attend our scheduled live sessions. If you miss a live session, review the class recording and complete missing assignments in Schoology. Fill out the [Insight PA Attendance Form](#) immediately when it is not possible to log in. Your presence and involvement are required during live sessions via Nearpod, chat, mic, etc, in order to get an engagement and classwork grade. Together these are 45% of your grade! Chronic tardiness will quickly start counting as unexcused absences.

LATE WORK POLICY

You are expected to complete all work by the due dates assigned in Schoology. All assignments close ONE week after the end of the unit (unless you have made arrangements with me). You have ONE attempt for each assignment, unless specified otherwise. Assignment redos are at the discretion of your teacher. Come to office hours for questions about grades and make-up work.

"Life happened and I need help": If you experience any kind of life-altering event or emergency that impacts your ability to stay afloat in all your classes, all you need to do is email me or [your counselor](#) and we will try to get you the help you need. GRADEBOOK

Every Friday (Monday at the latest), I will submit grades for assignments that were due from the previous week. You will receive a zero for any missing overdue assignments.

Remember, all assignments close ONE week after the end of each unit (unless you have made arrangements with me). And you only get ONE attempt per assignment (unless specified otherwise).

EXTRA CREDIT

There is no extra credit. For each unit, however, there is a Notebook and Student of the Month badge that you can earn which functions as a homework pass—I will drop your lowest classwork/quiz score for each badge.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

All work for this class must be done by YOU. You will receive a zero on any submitted assignment containing plagiarized content (in part or full). Students assisting other students to cheat or plagiarize are also considered in violation of this policy, and will receive a zero on their assignment submission. Further infractions will result in receiving a grade of zero on the assignment. ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Make sure to give proper credit to all sources used in academic assignments, whether quoted, paraphrased, or summarized. If you use generative AI to help you with an assignment, make sure to cite it, even if you're paraphrasing. I do NOT recommend quoting AI text, but if you do, put it in quotes and cite it. If you do use AI, please double-check the accuracy of the statements with your own research. Use another source for citations.

Here are some things to keep in mind when communicating with school staff or fellow students:

- Respect the privacy and wishes of your fellow students.
- Flaming, spamming, bullying or other unwanted contact, including inappropriate message content or attachments, will be considered a breach of this policy. Infractions may result in disciplinary action by the school administration.

PRO-TIP: If you feel even slightly tempted to engage in academic dishonesty for the sake of a better grade, come talk to me or your Advisor and we'll give you all sorts of tips to earn that grade you're hoping for. If you need more time to complete an assignment, just let me know and we can work on a solution.

If you cheat, you could be putting your status at the school in jeopardy. Multiple violations can lead to suspension or expulsion. See the [Insight PA Student Handbook](#) for more info. You are also guaranteed to lose all my trust and make me very, very aggravated that I have to deal with it/you.

Do not cheat. That's really all there is to it.
